## **Plot Summary**

This movie is a modern and funny look at the ideas of love, marriage, relationships and death. The movie follows a group of friends, and what happens to them, during four weddings and one funeral. During the five different ceremonies, this group of friends have many humorous, warm, and sometimes sad experiences as they search for their future partners.

The main character in this group is Charles. He is in search of "true love that hits you like a thunderbolt". The other friends in his group are also in search of true love in one form or another. Please note how very properly British and polite the characters act, even in embarrassing situations. Charles and Tom, especially, often put their "foot in their mouth".

The movie also examines the loneliness of love by looking at broken relationships, the search for love, and unrequited love. Unrequited love means when you love somebody but they don't know or they don't love you.

This movie also raises the issue of love in different forms, as shown by two homosexual lovers. It also raises the issue of "The Physically Challenged" in modern society. But, most of all, this is a very funny, warm, and human film that everyone can relate to because love is a basic human condition!
